Speciesism: The Movie [USA, 2013] This documentary, by director Mark Devries, explores the concept and practice of speciesism, the valuation of beings on the basis of species membership. It features interviews with, among others, Peter Singer, Richard Dawkins, Temple Grandin, and Steven Best, along with material shot in and around factory farms in the United States. During the making of the film, Devries became a vegan.

Speciesism is the idea or assumption that humans are superior beings. which leads to the cruel and unjust treatment of other beings. This superiority leads to mistreatment of other beings. Animals are humiliated, injured, experimented on, and slaughtered under the belief that they are here to serve humankind. While the film introduces the viewer to the concept of speciesism, it also offers suggestions for taking action.

JOIN US FOR OUR PEACE VIGIL this Friday, May 8th at 5 p.m. We will hold a large sign: Black Lives Matter/All Lives Matter. The Baltimore Quaker Peace and Justice Committee will hold a meeting afterwards from 6-7 p.m. to review next steps for the Baltimore Quaker community.

Last Friday 33 people stood in front of Homewood from 5-6 p.m., holding a large sign: "Black Lives Matter/All Lives Matter." The response from most of those driving by was enthusiastic and positive. We were very grateful that several people from Baltimore Yearly Meeting (including Jolee Robinson, BYM Clerk Ken Stockbridge, and Executive Secretary Riley Robinson) were there to support Baltimore Friends.

ISLAMIC STATE IN IRAQ: WHERE ARE THINGS HEADED? The stunning advances of the so-called Islamic State in Iraq and Syria have put all ethnic and religious groups in the area, including moderate Sunni Arabs, at risk. For some groups, the threat approaches genocidal proportions. From President Obama on down, everyone agrees there is no military solution, but past and present U.S. policies leave the U.S. unable to do the heavy political and diplomatic lifting needed to quell the violence. While there is lip service to the idea that there is no military solution, the discourse in the U.S. is almost solely about military means.

On **Wednesday, May 6**, at 6:30 p.m., at the Baltimore <u>Central Library</u>, Poe Room, 400 Cathedral Street, Jim and Deb Fine, who worked for the Mennonite Central Committee in Iraq, will talk about what needs to change to bring about the end of the "Islamic State." While my practice of Quakerism is rooted in my experience of God, that is not the case for all Quakers. For some Friends—indeed for most Friends—Quakerism is first a religion, an understanding and experience of God that leads to a certain way of life. But for others it is a way of life rich in its own right, needing no origin in or confirmation from a divine entity. To the question, "Is Quakerism a way of life or a religion?" I would answer, "It depends upon the Quaker." This dual reality explains the wide diversity among Friends today. For some, Quakerism is a religion, a way of comprehending and relating to God, usually through the life and witness of Jesus. But that is not all it is. For the atheist Friend, Quakerism is a way of living in the world so that the world is made more just, loving, and peaceable by his or her presence.
