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Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, The Fifth Query, Personal way of Life: Do you live in accordance with your spiritual convictions? Do you seek employment consistent with your beliefs and in service to society? Do you practice simplicity in speech, dress and manner of living, avoiding wasteful consumption? Are you watchful that your possessions do not rule you? Do you strive to be truthful at all times, avoiding judicial oaths?

Do you strive to develop your physical, emotional and mental capacities toward reaching your Divinely given potential? Do you cultivate healthful and moderate habits, avoiding the hazards of drugs, intoxicants, and over-indulgence generally? Do you try to direct such emotions as anger and fear in creative ways?

Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, Advices for The Fifth Query:

The individual Friend should lead a life rooted in an awareness of God's presence in all times and places. Although special times and locations may provide helpful reminders of the need for spiritual communion, they cannot take the place of turning daily to God for guidance. The foundation for all our personal life and social relations should be the consciousness of the Holy Spirit.

Sincerity, simplicity and moderation are vital to all the dealings of life. We advise the observance of care in speech and the use of only such statements as convey truth without exaggeration or omission of essential fact. Taking legal oaths implies a double standard of truthfulness and is contrary to the teaching of Jesus.

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Quaker faith welds the beliefs of its Christian foundation with the conviction that the Holy Spirit speaks to men and women and children of all races at all times. It draws individuals into a community of worship and of work for the redemption and improvement of human life. A Friends Meeting should be such a community. It should involve frequent, regular coming together in a common spiritual search, with members sharing experiences and insights, and finding the channels of service to which we are called individually and collectively.

<u>SILENT VIGIL FOR PEACE: Every Friday.</u> 5-6 p.m. Since 9/11/2001, we have held a vigil for peace every Friday evening. Join in at any time during the hour. The current focus is on "BLACK LIVES MATTER/ALL LIVES MATTER. On the first Friday of each month a potluck supper and video program follow the vigil.

<u>THE FRIDAY VIDEO SERIES</u>: follows the Peace Vigil and potluck supper on the first Friday of each month, and is sponsored by the Hiroshima-Nagasaki Commemoration Committee, the Baltimore Quaker Peace and Justice Committee of Homewood and Stony Run Meetings, and Chesapeake Physicians for Social Responsibility. Videos are followed by a discussion and are free for everyone.

Friday, May 6, *BUBBLE* [USA, 2006] Steven Soderbergh's film delicately examines the everyday life of three Ohio factory workers. To cast his film, Soderbergh used actual blue-collar workers from the Parkersburg, West Virginia / Belpre, Ohio. We see the desperation of working poverty, in which one works double shifts, stares at the TV, and collapses.

GOAT Noat for May: Environmental Victories in the Maryland Assembly

- Ø Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction Act (GGRA):Reauthorization (HB610/SB323)— requires a 40% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030. Governor Hogan signed into law.
- Ø Clean Energy Jobs Act (HB 1106/SB 921): increases Maryland's clean electricity standard—wind and solar—to 25% by 2020 and creates a dedicated clean energy jobs and business development program. Passed the General Assembly by large margins. Urge Governor Hogan to sign into law: org.salsalabs.com/o/423/p/dia/action3/common/public/?action KEY=19561
- Ø Pollinator Protection Act aka Pesticides or "Neonics" bill (HB211/SB198): requires a warning on plants that have been treated with neonicotinoids (neonics) and doesn't allow sale of these pesticides to consumers. Neonics have been confirmed to play a significant role in the alarming decline of bees and other pollinators. Passed the General Assembly. Urge Governor Hogan to sign into law: sierra.force.com/actions/Maryland?actionId=AR0034950
