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Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, the Seventh Query: Caring for Others

Do you respect that of God in every person? Do you search yourself for and strive to eliminate prejudices such as those related to race, religion, gender, age, sexual orientation, and economic condition? In what ways do you accept and appreciate differences among your friends and associates? Do you avoid exploiting or manipulating others to accomplish ends, however worthy?

Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, Advices for the Seventh Query:

#### **Prejudice and Discrimination**

From its earliest days, the Society of Friends has supported the equal right of all individuals to be treated with dignity and respect. The opposition of Friends to slavery is well known. Less well known is their support of the rights of women. Quakers, particularly Lucretia Mott, Susan B. Anthony, and Alice Paul, were in the forefront of the American suffrage movement. We oppose all forms of prejudice. Prejudice should never be allowed to keep any persons from a chance to develop or use their abilities, or deprive them of their political, economic or social rights. We are called to work creatively for equal opportunity in education, employment, justice, housing and the like.

Since thought and action are reflected in words, we should take care to use language that reflects the equal dignity and worth of all human beings. We support an ongoing search for broader language to express the continuing revelation of the nature of God. Use of masculine or feminine forms when referring to God perpetuates gender-specific images. With terms such as the Inner Light, That of God in Everyone, and the Seed, Friends already have a vocabulary which is inclusive.

#### **Those Requiring Special Care**

We must be sensitive to the need for an institutional and societal framework within which disadvantaged individuals can achieve dignity and can experience a purposeful life within the limits of their capabilities. Aging is a natural part of human life. At no time should people be considered to be on the periphery of society because of their age. Older persons, who represent an increasingly large portion 2 of the population, have varied talents, interests and concerns. Friends have a long tradition of appreciation of the gifts of older members, and our Meetings should continue to encourage participation of all ages in Meeting activities.

The same concern for human dignity, and opposition to the use of physical force and violence, has motivated Friends to work toward improvement in institutions and services for the aged, for the mentally or emotionally ill, the retarded, and the handicapped. Employment of members of these groups is encouraged, as well as special education and training.

The Society of Friends has long worked toward improvement in the treatment of offenders. While continuing to press for programs of rehabilitation inside prisons, Friends also recognize a need for pretrial justice and the elimination of police brutality. Friends are led to oppose capital punishment by our belief in the sanctity of life.

#### FIRST DAY SCHOOL: Epistle from Homewood's First Day School Students

Homewood's First Day School class of 2021 is rounding out our year by reflecting on all that we've accomplished. In September of 2020, the class once again braved a COVID school year. The students returned fully prepared for their new-normal Zoom lessons and masked meetings. As seasoned veterans of digital learning, our students approached the school year with relatively little apprehension and a lot of flexibility. This year our First Day School class focused on the New Testament, specifically on the life and work of Jesus. Lessons around Jesus were conveyed over Zoom and by the occasional meeting in-person.

In order to learn about Jesus, we established what students already knew, mainly that he was kind and valued peace. From there we broadened the group's understanding of Jesus. We discussed his

role as not just a social activist, but a social disruptor. The group also learned about the cultural context in which Jesus grew up and how that may have shaped the life he led. Throughout the year students were encouraged to connect lessons to our current times.

Throughout the year, we were also able to hold some social-distanced gatherings. In the fall, we kicked off our year with a community tie-dying event. And soon, we began work on our Nativity pageant. Given COVID restrictions, students opted to brave a new type of stage, a Zoom screen. The decision was made to not only conduct the pageant over Zoom but to utilize puppets. Students and families gathered over the course of several weeks to create puppets of all varieties and set the stage for a digital pageant. This new medium allowed us to share the pageant with the greater Meeting despite the strange circumstances.

Beginning in the new year our first-day class began a food drive. The drive was partially inspired by the lessons of the year but it was mainly motivated by a desire the students held to get involved and make a difference. During the drive we were able to collect 250 pounds of food for the CARES food pantry. As spring began to arrive and the sun once again graced the Homewood grounds, our first day class seized every opportunity we could to meet in person. In celebration of Earth Day the students gathered to plant seeds and discuss our relationship with the environment. On a particularly sunny day we gathered to create student silhouettes. And in honor of May Day we marked the occasion by decorating a May Bush.

As the year now draws to a close, the Religious Education Committee once again applauds the resilience of our First Day School students. Today we celebrate the return of many Friends to Homewood's physical meeting room. We recognize that due to social-distancing and virtual sessions First Day School may have seemed to disappear from the regular activities of our greater Meeting. But it is with full hearts that we say we haven't left and we will be back. For now our students look forward to a summer where BYM camps will be happening! And our world will be getting a little safer every day. We will see you all this fall!

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#### Witness Regarding War Taxes from Stan Becker

Normally the tax due date is the 15th of April (4th month). Some Homewood Friends years ago participated in a peace witness at the main post office as thousands of people drove and walked up on that last day/evening to submit their tax forms. Obviously with internet submissions growing every year and this year with COVID, that witness has been abandoned.

With very few exceptions, Friends who receive a 'paycheck' are contributing to war and the preparation for war. It has been estimated that somewhere between 30 and 40% of our tax monies go for military purposes (the exact percentage depends on how one counts interest on the debt from past wars, education and health benefits for present and former military personnel, basic research, etc.)

I was a conscientious objector in the late 1960s but did not need to do alternative service because of my lottery number. As a young person, I made specific efforts to live below a taxable income. I had to ask my summer employer in New York City to stop paying me two weeks early so I would not go above that threshold. Working three years in Bangladesh, I had a hardship deduction that kept me below the limit until my last year there when I owed \$500. A Philadelphia Friend advised me to send a check for that amount to President Carter asking that he see that it be used for peaceful purposes. (The White House returned it but the IRS never pursued the case.)

Back in the U.S. and after marriage it was impossible to live below a taxable income. It became clear that I needed to devote as many resources to peace as were taken for war. My witness has been to give as much to peace groups each year as the IRS takes for the military. The peace groups that I donate to are: <a href="Peace Tax Fund">Peace Tax Fund</a>, <a href="Friends Peace Teams">Friends Peace Teams</a>, <a href="Christian Peacemaker Teams">Christian Peacemaker Teams</a>, <a href="Peacemaker Teams">Peace Brigades International</a>, and <a href="Nonviolent Peaceforce">Nonviolent Peaceforce</a>.

Simultaneously we send a letter to our Congressional representatives asking them to support the Peace Tax Fund bill; this legislation would allow conscientious objectors to have all their tax monies used for peaceful purposes. John Lewis was the sponsor of this legislation for many years and a new sponsor is soon to be announced I am told.

If anyone is interested in seeking clearness on a similar witness, I would be glad to assist.


