WORKING FOR CHANGE

A Change Group has been meeting at Homewood for the past year. Its purpose is spelled out below.

Under the care of Homewood's Ministry and Counsel committee, and attending to guidance from the BYM Working Group on Racism, the Change Group provides leadership and offers resources, discernment and concrete actions that support the Meeting on its journey in becoming an active anti-racist faith community.

In Spring of 2021, Homewood approved the following statement:

Homewood Friends Meeting seeks to be a diverse community which comes together in worship and action. We open ourselves to that radically loving spirit which guides us to live justly and peaceably. Homewood Friends Meeting affirms the worth and dignity of each person. We strive to actively dismantle systemic racism and its harmful effects within our community and the larger society.

Meeting-wide Forum on Becoming an Active Anti-Racist Faith Community

It is now our task to discern how to fulfil this commitment. For this purpose, we are holding an all-meeting forum on **September 12 from 1:00 to 2:30** on Zoom. We will update participants on the work of the committee, worship share on how the Spirit moves us to move forward, and briefly discuss the structure of the committee.

Congratulations to Sarah Szanton for her appointment as the new Dean of the Johns Hopkins University School of Nursing. Dr. Szanton currently serves as the Patricia M. Davidson Health Equity and Social Justice Endowed Professor at the SON and is the director of the school's Center for Innovative Care in Aging. She also has a joint faculty appointment in the Department of Health Policy and Management in the Bloomberg School of Public Health.

Dr. Szanton is deeply committed to advancing diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives at the SON and in nursing more broadly, and she has a record of accomplishment in promoting health equity, social justice, and antiracism in her research and education.

GREEN ORGANIZING ACTION TEAM:"GOAT NOAT" FOR SEPTEMBER 2021

The monthly GOAT Noat is back after a summer break with more news **about the pilot program to collect residential food scraps in Baltimore City at five Department of Public Works Residential Drop-Off sites serving the City.** City residents can now take their scraps to any of the collection sites (see locations below). Food scraps make up about 25% of the residential waste stream. Redirecting these materials to composting programs will make a major contribution to the multipronged efforts by the City to reach zero waste as described in the "Less Waste, Better Baltimore" 2020 plan.



The pilot program began on July 12 and will be in effect for 3 to 4 months, until sometime in October or November when the program will be evaluated. Materials that are accepted include fruits and vegetables, eggshells, grains, coffee grounds, tea bags and bread. This list of accepted items is the same as the list that collections at the City's Farmer's Markets have used since 2019.

Compost Crew will haul the food scraps from the five sites and transport the material to the Prince George's County Organics Composting Facility. Compost Crew is one of a handful of companies in the area providing curbside food scrap collection for a monthly fee.

Please consider supporting this pilot program so that collecting and composting materials will become part of the City's service program and residential culture.

The GOAT will follow up with an update this fall.

BYM CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTOR WORKSHOP: Selective Service System (SSS) registration for a possible draft into compulsory U.S. military service, now, is automatic in most states when getting a state driver's license. If the draft is reinstated, they could have as little as nine days to prepare a CO claim before having to go before a local draft board. Thus, Quaker youth could easily miss the chance to claim status as a conscientious objector (CO).

Thinking About Race – (September 2021) "Race Manners"

Race Manners: Which Black People Should I Believe?

June 28, 2021, The New York Times By Jené Desmond-Harris

As you know, there's no committee that gets a consensus from the over 41 million Black people in this country and issues proclamations about the right way for white people to think about racism.

For what it's worth, the fact that you care at all — that you value what Black people have to say and that you take seriously the idea of listening — puts you ahead of plenty of Americans who wholly disregard what Black people experience or simply want the worst for us. So, in my opinion, you're on the right track.

And I have empathy for you because I've been there — wanting to do the right thing when it comes to marginalized groups to which I don't belong, while encountering conflicting takes about what the right thing is. Is it helpful to transgender people or cringeworthy for cis people to put pronouns in our bios and email signatures? Are straight people a supportive or annoying presence at Pride? Am I honoring or alienating people if I use "Latinx" instead of "Latino"? Is "fat" a straightforward descriptor that I should use to support people who have reclaimed it, or is the pain the word still causes for some reason enough to avoid it?

I've had to accept that there won't be a single clear answer and that I have to take responsibility for wherever I land on these questions. To get to a similar place, here's what I think you should do: When you're thinking about this, start by replacing "Black people want racism to stop playing such a big role in their lives, and I want to make sure I'm listening to the right ones so that I can feel like a good ally" with "I want racism to stop playing such a big role in all of our lives, and I'll support things that I believe will make that happen." You've heard the expression about how we need co-conspirators, not allies, right? Even if you're not personally a victim of racism, you can — and should — still think of yourself as someone who has skin in the game.

Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, the Ninth Ouery: The Social Order

Do you promote social justice and make your life a testimony to fair dealing? Do you seek to understand and appreciate differing cultures and social values? Do you support fair treatment of all regardless of race, gender, age and other differences? Are you concerned for those in our society who are disadvantaged? Do you take your full share of civic responsibility by voting and giving service? Do you oppose the use of land, labor, technology and capital for human exploitation or in ways destructive to other living things?

Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, Advices for the Ninth Query:

Civic Responsibility

Friends believe that the aim of government is to preserve a community in which justice, peace, good order and individual development are possible. Members of our Society are also citizens of the community and the nation. Quakerism is not intended to be a refuge from the disturbing events of our times, but rather a source of strength and support in facing them. The free institutions under which we live give many of our members a direct share in the responsibilities of government and in forming a healthy public opinion. ...

Whether or not directly involved in government, we need to consider carefully our responsibilities in influencing legislation and educating fellow citizens on public issues. Friends

should work with people in other churches and in the community to bring about desirable ends through the institutional resources of society.

From the beginning, Friends have found that loyalty to God results at times in refusal of the demands of the state, as in opposition to war and unjust laws, and have supported decisions of conscience taken by individual Friends. Before deciding on a course which involves civil disobedience, a Friend should consult with persons of trusted judgment who have sympathy with the individual's sense of duty. Clearness committees within the Meeting are valuable in such situations.

Vocational and Financial Decisions

The relationships, decisions, and actions of our working lives should reflect a calling to the service of God. Our witness will be unconvincing unless we seek and heed Divine guidance. Individual leadings vary with differences in talents and interests. Each Friend's talents, however, should be fully used.

Investment of assets and consumption of resources require our careful stewardship. As Friends we can direct our investments toward socially desirable ends, avoiding speculation and activities wasteful or harmful to others. We seek to participate constructively and without greed in the economic life of the community. We should refrain from undue accumulation of wealth as well as irresponsible borrowing.

Friends' Meetings and concerns require money and time. Non-pastoral Meetings do not need as much financial support as churches with paid ministers, but our concerns do call for considerable funding. We are required to give generously of our time, since our way of serving the Spirit depends on our personal efforts. For every Friend, the responsibility to give generously of both money and time is real. Monthly Meetings should provide regular opportunities for us to discuss our practices in the use of money and time. Wills should be made and periodically revised with care. This avoids difficulties for heirs and beneficiaries. The needs of our own family members and the merits of contributions to worthy causes should be considered in a spirit of love. Selection of a capable and understanding executor is encouraged.

Social Responsibility

The basic Quaker trust in the Light within leads to our trust in the inherent dignity and sacredness of each person. This trust, combined with our Society's own history of persecution, underlies our social witness.

Some concerns which once drew the witness of Friends are obsolete today, but still we have many challenges. War, violence in streets and homes, injustice in the justice system, prejudice and discrimination, the plights of starving, homeless and disadvantaged people, and business conduct which involves exploitation of people or nature's resources all these still call us to action in obedience to the Spirit.
