REPORT ON PRIDE MONTH: by Malachy Kilbride, Clerk of Peace & Social Justice Committee

Coming out of two years of Covid restrictions and cancellations of many annual events, LGBTQ Pride Month was celebrated in Baltimore during June of 2022.

An inaugural, and many hope an annual, Trans Pride celebration began with a festive march starting outside of Homewood Friends Meeting on Charles Street. Friends from Homewood Monthly Meeting welcomed and celebrated the Trans Pride march contingents on June 4th as the parade passed by our meetinghouse. A street celebration took place at the end of the parade

between 23rd Street and North Avenue near the offices of **Baltimore Safe Haven** which organized the Trans Pride events. Baltimore Safe Haven is the city's only Trans led drop-in center providing a variety of services and support for the Trans community. Baltimore Safe Haven states that the Trans community "...is one of the nation's most threatened by violence, trauma, and homelessness because of their gender identity and sexual orientation. Baltimore Safe Haven focuses on those members with an annual median income of less than \$10,000, who are currently engaged in or have a history in sex work, who are substance users, and who are either homeless or at risk of becoming homeless."

Towards the end of June, on Saturday the 25th Homewood Friends also celebrated, welcomed, and participated in the Baltimore LGBTQ Pride Parade which also started outside the meetinghouse. In addition, Homewood Friends opened the doors of our meetinghouse offering use of our restrooms for those participating in the parade celebration. Several Friends joined the parade marching with the interfaith group, **Faith Communities of Baltimore with Pride**.

In over 40 plus years of the modern civil rights movement of LGBTQ people across the country there has been progress and change for the better. However, equality and safety within our communities remain a serious concern for LGBTQ people and their allies. In our Charles Village community this June 2022 we saw disturbing acts of arson. Pride flags in the Charles Village neighborhood were set on fire causing houses to be burned and residents sent to hospital. On June 19th, several Friends from Homewood Monthly Meeting walked over to the burned-out homes, spoke with our neighbors, and held a short vigil outside the targeted homes in our community. In addition to this disturbing act of arson in our immediate neighborhood, the offices of Baltimore Safe Haven were burglarized and vandalized earlier this year in addition to a burglary late in 2021.

Pandemic update: We continue to monitor local positivity rates and other pandemic indicators. We still **require masks inside the meetinghouse** for all large gatherings. Our full pandemic protocols are on our website.

The building is open to committees and renters. We have welcomed both our returning renters and some new groups. Building users are required to follow all pandemic guidelines. Please contact the office to schedule space in the meetinghouse.

Thinking About Race - (July-August 2022) Under the Skin

Excerpts from Jerald Walker's review of Linda Villarosa's book, Under the Skin – The Hidden Toll of Racism on American Lives and on the Health of Our Nation, The Washington Post, June 12, 2022. https://www.washingtonpost.com/outlook/2022/06/10/racisms-ill-effects-health-care-system-body-itself/

Equal treatment within the health-care system, Villarosa argues, regardless of class or social status, remains elusive because of three primary obstacles: long-standing institutional and structural discrimination; implicit biases in the medical profession resulting not only in misdiagnoses but even blame for being unwell; and "weathering," which, Villarosa writes, refers to the "struggle with anger and grief triggered by everyday racist insults and microaggressions ... [which] can, over time, deteriorate the systems of the body."

Villarosa cites a 2007 American Journal of Public Health study that demonstrates that Black women who reported experiencing racial discrimination had double to triple the rate of low-birth-weight babies compared with Black women who did not report incidents of discrimination. Summing up, Villarosa writes, "The researchers' conclusion: low birth weights among African American women have more to do with the experience of racism than with race."

To combat racism in health care, Villarosa advocates implicit-bias training for medical personnel and champions expanding the diversity of students, faculty and curriculums in medical schools.
