Thank you for reading our newsletter! We have lots of updates and upcoming events, but first, you're invited to reflect on the current month's Query from Baltimore Yearly Meeting.

#### Faith and Practice of Baltimore Yearly Meeting

the Fourth Query: Personal Spiritual Life

Do you make time for meditation, prayer, and worship?

Do you read the Bible, the writings of Friends, and other inspirational works, seeking new light?

Do you regularly seek God's guidance?

Are you open to guidance and support, and do you give thanks for them?

Do you share your spiritual insights with others and willingly receive from them in return?

#### Advices for the Fourth Query:

The Divine Spirit, which Friends variously call the Inner Light, the Light of Truth, the Christ Within, That of God in Everyone, has power to reveal, to overcome evil, and to enable us to carry out God's will. Quaker testimonies arise from listening to and obeying this Spirit.

Quaker faith welds the beliefs of its Christian foundation with the conviction that the Holy Spirit speaks to men and women and children of all races at all times. It draws individuals into a community of worship and of work for the redemption and improvement of human life. A Friends Meeting should be such a community. It should involve frequent, regular coming together in a common spiritual search, with members sharing experiences and insights, and finding the channels of service to which we are called individually and collectively.

The meeting for worship is the heart of every Friends Meeting. Baltimore Yearly Meeting generally has unprogrammed worship based on waiting in silence, and founded on faith that human beings can commune directly with God. In expectant silence we strive to center inwardly. Each is aided by the seeking of others, so that worship becomes a corporate experience.

Vocal ministry should arise out of a sense of being inwardly moved to share a message aloud. Sometimes a message is not ripe yet, or comes clearly but is meant only for the person receiving it, not

for the group. Some Friends are led to speak frequently, and others only rarely; yet the timid or brief message of one who seldom speaks may be as moving and helpful as that of a more practiced speaker. The experienced speaker should be watchful not to speak too often or at undue length. No Friend should come to meeting for worship with an intention to speak or not to speak.

We are obliged also to recognize and nurture the gifts of other Friends. The spiritual quality of our meetings for worship deepens when those who are led to speak out of the silence receive 2 encouragement and help. The fabric of the Meeting community and the larger community is strengthened when Friends who serve the community receive loving support from other Friends.


Nurturing the life of the Spirit requires frequent communication with the Divine Spirit. It is not sufficient to rely solely on an hour (or less) on First Day mornings, or on brief moments of silence before meals or committee meetings. We should make room in each day to know that of God within ourselves. God's help and healing can be sought in many ways, including vocal or silent prayer, meditation, visualization, silent listening, and confident affirmation. Friends seek harmony with the Divine Will, individually or in groups, sometimes laying our concerns before God, sometimes asking for guidance, sometimes giving thanks for the beauty and blessing in our lives.

Some highlights





As Baltimore peace activists prepare to welcome the Golden Rule, some Friends have started a book circle to reflect on queries about the ship's historical voyage as told by one of the original crew members. In 1958, a small crew, including three Quakers, sailed to the Marshall Islands to disrupt nuclear weapons testing which was inflicting long-term damage on the people, ecology, and our chance to live without nuclear weapons. As you can see from the photos, it is a lovely place, and Howard Brod, a member of their Financial Stewardship Committee, provided this update:

Again, thank you for your support from Homewood. It's hard to believe so many years have already passed by. Midlothian Friends Meeting is thriving and doing well! I am sure having a wonderful meetinghouse, located on nearly 5 wooded acres at a wildlife preserve, has gone a long way to our success. We would have never acquired such wonderful facilities for worship without your assistance.

Homewood is fortunate to have a large endowment provided by Friends over the years, and the Trustees include loans like this in the overall investment strategy. A few years ago, we made a loan to GEDCO for Stadium Place here in Baltimore. This year, we are planning to make a loan to Adelphi Friends Meeting as they undertake major renovations to their Meetinghouse.

## GOAT Noat

While it was not a particularly hard winter, the Green Organizing Action Team (GOAT) is looking forward to spring.

**Garden Club** The first garden club workday will be held on Saturday, April 15<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 – 11:30 AM. All are welcome to join in on the fun of weeding, pruning, and mulching. Get down and get dirty! This will be a good time to spruce up the garden in preparation for the wedding of Dominique and Paula on April 29<sup>th</sup>. There will be more opportunities to work in the garden throughout the summer.

The 2023 Maryland General Assembly wraps up its session on Monday, April 10<sup>th</sup> at midnight, what is known as Sine Die. GOAT members have been advocating for several key pieces of environmental legislation. We have a particular interest in setting greenhouse gas reduction goals for Maryland's home energy efficiency program ("EmPOWER"), and transitioning away from fossil fuel appliances like gas stoves. SB 905/ HB 1035 combines a few initiatives for accomplishing these goals. It has passed committees in both chambers but only has a few days left to reach a final vote.

**Cisterns to Collect Rainwater** We are eagerly awaiting word about a \$5000 grant that would allow us to replace the non-functioning cisterns. Carol Beck put the grant application together and submitted it to the Chesapeake Bay Trust. We hope to have the green light to work with our partner organization, Blue Water Baltimore, on the project this spring.

**Composter in the Garden** GOAT is partnering with the Hospitality Committee to move toward a no waste goal in the kitchen. GOAT purchased a new composting bin last fall. Located adjacent to the side porch, composting of food scraps and compostable plates is fully underway!

#### THE SENATE HAS FINALLY VOTED TO END THE IRAQ WAR

On March 29, the Senate voted for the first time to repeal the outdated and overstretched 2002 Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMF), which was passed more than two decades ago to authorize the Iraq war.

By a vote of 66-30, the Senate passed Sens. Tim Kaine (VA) and Todd Young's (IN) bipartisan bill, S. 316, marking the first time in decades that the Senate has voted to end a war.

The 2002 Iraq AUMF was originally passed to authorize war against Saddam Hussein's government to defend the United States against the alleged threat of weapons of mass destruction. Hussein's regime was toppled two decades ago, but the 2002 Iraq AUMF remained in place.

It has been controversially interpreted to provide broad authority for military operations far outside its original scope, including as a justification for killing Iranian General Qassem Soleimani in January of 2020. Leaving this AUMF in place risks allowing future administrations to abuse it and further usurp Congress's constitutional responsibility to decide when the United States chooses war.

"A Congressional repeal of the [2002 Iraq AUMF] is a vital step to help heal our country's addiction to war and end endless wars," said FCNL General Secretary Bridget Moix. "What we can invest more in to build a safer world is peacebuilding and global cooperation. True peace is more than the absence of fighting. It is addressing the root causes of war and managing conflict nonviolently. As long as the United States can still attack and kill with impunity in Iraq, neither its people nor ours will know true peace."

The Senate vote follows years of incremental progress towards repeal—progress that FCNL advocates have been a crucial part of. FCNL's constituents worked for many years to build bipartisan support in both chambers of Congress for repealing the Iraq War authorization. These efforts were vital to the House passage of Rep. Barbara Lee's (CA-13) bill in 2021 to repeal the 2002 Iraq AUMF (H.R. 256). That legislation passed by a strong bipartisan vote of 268-161, including 49 Republican "yes" votes.

It is now up to the House to send a bill repealing the 2002 Iraq AUMF to the president's desk. Read the <u>full article by FCNL's Kevin Snow</u> here to find out more about the promising prognosis.
