

Homewood Friends are invited to the Hinenu Shabbat service on Friday 1/24 at 6:30 PM in the meeting room. Hinenu's members are invited to attend our own Meeting for Worship on the following Sunday. What to expect in a Hinenu Shabbat service? Prayer style features lots of chant and song, and is primarily in Hebrew. All words are transliterated, and you are welcome to participate by singing along or sitting and being present however you are most comfortable. The Friday night service begins with a songful first half, then transitioning into more liturgically heavy prayer, that is still musical. There is a short sermon from the rabbi, and often a discussion as well!
