From the BYM Advices

1) Meeting for Worship The meeting for worship is the heart of every Friends Meeting. Baltimore Yearly Meeting generally has unprogrammed worship based on waiting in silence, and founded on faith that human beings can commune directly with God. In expectant silence we strive to center inwardly. Each is aided by the seeking of others, so that worship becomes a corporate experience.

Friends approach the meeting for worship confidently, believing that God speaks directly to us, revealing Divine Will and guiding those who listen. Each worshiper becomes a listener ready to receive God's message, which may come in the silence or in spoken words. [...]

2) Vocal Ministry Waiting upon the Holy Spirit in silent expectation and prayer is the basis of our meeting for worship. Vocal ministry should arise out of a sense of being inwardly moved to share a message aloud. Sometimes a message is not ripe yet, or comes clearly but is meant only for the person receiving it, not for the group. Some Friends are led to speak frequently, and others only rarely; yet the timid or brief message of one who seldom speaks may be as moving and helpful as that of a more practiced speaker. [...]

GOAT's Noats

For the next few months, the Green Organizing and Action Team (GOAT) will focus on **environmental proposals in the Maryland General Assembly**. We know the likely provisions of two important pieces of legislation that could have major impact on the environment: the Bottle Bill and the RENEW Act.

1) A Bottle Bill: Maryland Beverage Container Recycling Refund and Litter Reduction Program

This bill was filed in 2024 and will be back in 2025. Its goals include achieving a bottle redemption rate of at least 90% for the approximately \$5.2 billion single-use beverage containers sold annually in the State. The bill would:

- Add a deposit Charge a small deposit on beverage containers made of glass, plastic, or aluminum.
- **Offer a refund** Customers would receive a refund when they return the container to a redemption facility for recycling. This could be at the store where the container was purchased or elsewhere.
- **Establish a stewardship organization** A nonprofit organization would be selected to represent beverage producers in the state. The organization would develop and implement stewardship plans.
- **Create a grant program** Ten percent of unclaimed deposits would fund a grant program to encourage recycling and reuse.

GOAT presented information on a Maryland Bottle Bill to Homewood's Meeting for Business on December 1st. The minutes conveyed Homewood's general support for a Bottle Bill. Further discussion is expected at the January 2025 Meeting for Business. Bottle Bill info sheet here.

2) The RENEW Act (Responding to Emergency Needs from Extreme Weather)

This proposal would allow Maryland to fund billions of dollars of critical infrastructure projects needed to adapt to a warming world. The RENEW Act is based on a policy that was first introduced in the U.S. Congress by Senator Chris Van Hollen (D-MD). A Renew Act has now been introduced in four states and has passed in Vermont.

This proposal enables Maryland to levy a one-time fee on the largest fossil fuel companies doing business in Maryland. Funds raised would fund infrastructure projects and mitigate the impact of climate change on Marylanders especially in low- and middle-income communities that are the most vulnerable to climate change. Quaker Voice of Maryland (QVM)

QVM, representing Monthly Meetings in Maryland that are in Philadelphia and Baltimore Yearly Meetings, is conducting a survey to assist in the determination of Maryland's legislative priorities for the environment and for racial justice. The results are anticipated later in January and will help provide valuable guidance for legislative advocacy by Friends through the end of the General Assembly.

GOAT is an open committee and welcomes members or attenders with an interest in the environment. We are currently modifying our committee meeting time in 2025.
