

We should encourage adult members to follow their leadings in seeking education of all kinds and should be sensitive in offering the financial assistance sometimes needed to take advantage of such opportunities.



Black Fire: African American Quakers on

Spirituality and Human Rights, edited by

Harold D. Weaver, Jr., Paul, Kriese, and

Stephen W. Angell.

This anthology contains entries from Benjamin Banneker (1731-1806) up to authors of the 21st century. They illuminate and interpret the ways that race, race relations, religion, and social justice relate to the Religious Society of Friends. The three prefaces, one by each editor, provide a strong foundation for the essays. The book highlights the degree to which American Quakers were interracial almost from the outset, and how Black leaders have shaped Friends' spiritual path.
