

## CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE MEETING


This is a reminder from the Trustees that contributions from members and attenders make up about a quarter to a third of the Meeting's annual budget.

# GOAT's Noats

## Gardening

Winter is upon us and the garden has pretty much been put to bed. You may have noticed that one major limb on the cherry tree has been removed. The last major project still to be done is pruning the prolific fig tree on the south-facing brick wall. When it is time to resume gardening – February or March – GOAT will send out a call for volunteers. Sharing gardening is a wonderful way to get to know fellow Friends.

## Legislation

Our advocacy for environmental legislation is ongoing. A major focus is the RENEW Act. <u>Read</u> more from the Chesapeake Climate Action Network, and below.

The RENEW Act or (Responding to Emergency Needs and Extreme Weather Act) is a bill championed by Environmental organizations across the State. The legislation aims to make large fossil fuel companies pay for climate change damages. The legislation would require companies that emitted more than a billion tons of greenhouse gases to pay a one-time fee to fund Maryland's climate resilience and recovery efforts. This model is quite similar to a super fund. In April 2025, the General Assembly approved a study bill with a strong showing of both Democrats and Republicans. However, Governor Moore vetoed the study bill leaving an uncertain future for how the state will address weather related disasters. GOAT will continue to follow the RENEW Act with a focus on whether there will be a legislative override of the Governor's veto from May 2025. The 2026 General Assembly will open on January 14th 2026, Wednesday at Noon.


